Saddam's return in the late 1970s coincided with Saddam Hussein's ascent to vice president and de facto ruler—a transition enabled by the aging leadership's recognition that only a figure forged in the party's crucible could unify a fractured state.

By the early 1980s, Saddam had transformed Iraq's political landscape from revolutionary aspiration to authoritarian machine.
