The 19th and 20th centuries brought seismic shifts. As Italy unified and Rome became the capital, the city's scent was reshaped by nationalist symbolism. The scent of military parades, the polished marble of Via dei Fori Imperiali, and the clean, rain-washed stone of ancient ruins were curated to project national pride. Yet post-war industrialization introduced new aromas: exhaust from traffic, the synthetic scent of mass-produced cosmetics, and the sterile aroma of concrete and air conditioning that replaced historic ventilation. Tourism surged, and with it, a sanitized, commercialized scent—lavender-scented souvenirs, air-freshened piazzas, and perfumed street performers—distorted the authentic olfactory fabric. Geopolitically, Rome's scent functions as both soft power and contested territory. The Vatican's global influence radiates through its control of sacred aromas—incense, holy water, and relics—whose diffusion extends far beyond Italy's borders, embedding Roman ritual scent into Catholic life worldwide. Yet this influence is not unchallenged. Debates over

cultural patrimony, such as the repatriation of looted artifacts, tie directly to olfactory memory: the scent of a stolen artifact is not just historical—it is visceral, implicating present-day institutions in the erasure of sensory heritage. Similarly, Italy's struggle to manage overtourism has brought the city's scent into sharper political focus. Overcrowding, litter, and commercialized street food have altered the air quality and atmosphere, with locals and scholars alike lamenting the loss of Rome's intimate, lived scent in favor of a performative, tourist-centric aroma. Economically, the scent of Rome underpins a multibillion-euro industry. Tourism generates over 13% of Lazio's GDP, with olfactory branding central to marketing campaigns. UNESCO estimates that sensory experiences contribute up to 30% of visitor satisfaction in historic cities—Rome leads globally in this domain. But this economic valuation risks commodification. The very act of packaging Rome's scent—infused candles, scented postcards, and synthetic “ancient” fragrances—often distorts authenticity. Industry insiders highlight a paradox: Rome's scent thrives on scarcity and authenticity, yet its survival depends on controlled dissemination. Meanwhile, local businesses navigate a delicate balance: artisanal producers of traditional foods like pecorino, honey, and balsamic vinegar sustain olfactory continuity, but face pressure from mass-produced imitations flooding tourist zones. Academic discourse reveals deeper tensions. Historians and anthropologists argue that scent is a primary vessel of memory—more primal than sight or sound. Roman military marches, imperial processions, and religious rituals were structured around scent cues that signaled identity, status, and belonging. Today, urban planners and cultural strategists increasingly recognize this, integrating olfactory mapping into heritage conservation. First, integrating olfactory heritage into urban planning and tourism policy to protect sensory integrity without stifling life. Second, investing in scientific research—paleo-aromatology, environmental monitoring, and cultural neuroscience—to deepen understanding of scent's role in memory and identity. Third, fostering inclusive dialogue between policymakers, residents, artists, and global visitors to co-create a Rome that breathes authentically, not just appears picturesque. In the end, to understand the scent of Rome is to understand power, memory, and resilience. It is a city where every breath carries history—sometimes sweet, sometimes bitter, always layered. To walk its streets is to inhale a thousand lifetimes, each layer a whisper from the past, a pulse from the present, and a promise for the future. The construction of St. Peter's Basilica and the Vatican complex introduced new olfactory layers—incense, beeswax candles, and aged parchment. The Vatican's role as a spiritual and political center elevated scent to a tool of persuasion: the heavy, sweet aroma of burning frankincense during papal masses was designed to elevate the soul, to evoke heaven on earth. Yet beneath this sacred perfume lay the reality of a city shaped by conquest and corruption. The Sack of Rome in 1527, for example, left behind not just physical destruction but a palpable shift in air quality—dust, smoke, and the stench of decay mingling with incense, revealing Rome's scent as a palimpsest of glory and ruin. The Renaissance, often romanticized, was also a period of deliberate olfactory curation. Popes like Nicholas V and Julius II commissioned works that reshaped
