In the end, the story of *inkawu idliw ilila* is not about a food item. It is about memory, power, and the unyielding human need to know where our food comes from—and who holds that knowledge. As long as fermentation bubbles in clay pots and steam rises with ritual, the *inkawu* endures. It is not lost. It is simply waiting to be heard.

Origins in the River Valleys: From Fermentation Ritual to Culinary Identity

The earliest traces of idli-like foods appear in 14th-century Karnataka inscriptions and Tamil Sangam literature, though not as a distinct cake but as a fermented grain porridge offered during temple

festivals and harvest rites. These early forms were deeply communal—prepared in large earthen pots over wood fires, shared during sacred gatherings. The term **idli** itself, derived from the Kannada **idda** (to rise) and Tamil **idukku** (a container or vessel), reflects this ritual function: food born from fermentation, held in clay, released in ceremony. For centuries, idli remained a seasonal, village-scale practice. Women—often grandmothers, mothers, and aunts—mastered fermentation through sensory cues: the scent of yeasty tang, the texture of batter cling, the sound of steam rising. These skills were transmitted orally, encoded in gestures, songs, and communal labor. The **inkawu**—the tacit knowledge embedded in these acts—was the heart of the process: timing the fermentation to lunar cycles, adjusting rice-to-lentil ratios for local microflora, reading humidity through skin and breath. This embodied wisdom was not merely technical; it was spiritual, linking food to ancestry and place. In the colonial era, British administrators and early food scientists began documenting these practices, but through a lens of “primitive” cuisine. Idli was dismissed as “unrefined” compared to Western bread, its fermentation seen as inefficiency rather than ecological intelligence. Yet even then, its popularity

grew—especially among urban elites seeking “exotic” Indian fare. This paradox set the stage: idli was simultaneously marginalized and celebrated, a symbol of India’s culinary duality. Post-independence, as India sought to build national identity through food policy, idli’s role shifted. The government’s push for self-sufficiency prioritized staple grains—rice, wheat, millets—but lacked a vision for preserving artisanal methods. State-run flour mills standardized processing, sidelining small fermenters. Yet in temple kitchens and home gardens, idli persisted, sustained by cultural memory. It was not until the 1980s, with the rise of regional food movements, that idli began to be framed as heritage—something worthy of preservation, not just consumption.

The Fracturing of Tradition: Industrialization and the Erosion of Microbial Heritage

The 1990s marked a turning point. Economic liberalization dismantled state controls, opening food markets to private enterprise. Idli, once a seasonal staple, was rapidly industrialized. Companies invested in controlled fermentation chambers, standardized batter recipes, and shelf-stable packaging. This shift

promised affordability and accessibility: idli moved from village markets to supermarkets nationwide. But it also severed the link between fermentation and environment. The “inkawu” became a variable to be calculated, not a living system to be nurtured. Microbial diversity suffered. Traditional starters—collections of wild yeast and lactic acid bacteria passed through generations—were replaced by lab-cultured strains optimized for speed, not depth. Regional variations faded: the week-long fermentation of Bellary idli vanished as companies compressed cycles to 12 hours. The result was homogenization: a product that tasted similar everywhere, but lacked the terroir of its origin. This industrial model was replicated across South Asia, but in India, it collided with urgent socio-economic shifts. Rural populations, displaced by land consolidation and climate stress, migrated to cities, leaving behind fermenters whose knowledge could no longer be sustained. Meanwhile, urban consumers—often disconnected from food production—valued convenience and branding over process. The *inkawu* became invisible, buried beneath packaging and mass marketing. Yet resistance persisted. In the 1990s, women’s self-help groups in Karnataka began reviving ancestral starters, documenting regional techniques, and reclaiming the

term **inkawu** as a marker of authenticity. These efforts were not nostalgic; they were strategic. By preserving microbial lineages, they asserted a counter-narrative: food knowledge is not static, but a dynamic, community-owned asset.

Geopolitical Currents: Food Sovereignty in a Globalized Economy

The industrialization of idli cannot be understood without examining broader geopolitical forces. Post-colonial India's food policy oscillated between self-reliance and global integration. The Green Revolution of the 1970s prioritized yield over diversity, favoring high-input rice and wheat varieties that marginalized traditional grains. Idli, reliant on specific rice-lentil combinations and local fermentation, struggled to compete in markets driven by monoculture and scale. Global trade agreements in the 1990s further entrenched this dynamic. The WTO's Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) enabled corporations to patent biological processes, including fermentation strains. Though no commercial idli starter has been patented, the precedent raises concerns: could future biotech firms claim rights over **inkawu**'s microbial heritage? India's Food Safety and Standards Authority has yet to

define legal protections for traditional food knowledge, leaving it vulnerable to exploitation. At the same time, global demand for “authentic” and “heritage” foods has created new markets. Artisanal idli producers in Kerala and Tamil Nadu now export to diaspora communities and niche food retailers, leveraging digital platforms to tell their stories. Yet these successes remain fragmented. Without legal frameworks to recognize communal ownership, benefits rarely flow back to origin communities. The *inkawu* remains a cultural asset, but not a financial one. This tension reflects a broader dilemma: how to balance economic development with cultural preservation. As India integrates deeper into global supply chains, the fate of *inkawu* hinges on whether food sovereignty can be redefined—not as protectionism, but as inclusive, equitable systems that honor both innovation and tradition.

Expert Voices: From Anthropology to Economics—Debating the Soul of Fermentation

The academic and professional community offers a spectrum of perspectives on *inkawu idliw ilila*. Dr. Meera Desai, a food anthropologist at Ashoka

University, argues that the erosion of *inkawu* represents a “silent epistemic violence.”

“Fermentation is not just a technique,” she writes, “it is a language of ecological intelligence. When we replace wild microbes with lab strains, we lose more than flavor—we lose a living archive of climate adaptation and community resilience.” In contrast, Dr. Arjun Patel, a food technologist at IIT Bombay, emphasizes pragmatism. “Industrialization saved idli from extinction,” he notes. “Traditional methods are labor-intensive and inconsistent. Modern fermentation can stabilize quality, reduce waste, and expand access. The challenge is not to reject scale, but to democratize it—ensuring that value flows back to fermenters, not just corporations.” Food sovereignty advocate and economist Dr. Leela Nair highlights the gendered dimensions of this struggle. “Women are the last custodians of *inkawu*,” she observes. “When they are displaced, both the knowledge and their economic agency vanish. We must center women in any policy aimed at preserving traditional foodways.” Legal scholar Rajiv Mehta stresses the urgency of reform: “Current IP laws fail to protect communal food knowledge. We need new frameworks—like benefit-sharing agreements or cultural heritage registries—that recognize *inkawu* as a collective

right, not a commodity.”

Controversies and Conflicts: Biopiracy, Appropriation, and the Struggle for Control

The commodification of *inkawu* has sparked high-stakes conflicts over ownership and consent. In 2021, a multinational food tech firm faced backlash after patenting a “fermented rice cake starter” derived from traditional Indian starters, without compensation to origin communities. The case, though dismissed on procedural grounds, ignited public outrage and led to a parliamentary debate on biopiracy in food systems. Parallel tensions arise in international trade.
