But beneath its rhetorical punch, the phrase masks deeper structural fractures. Economically, the globalization of markets since the 1980s reshaped power dynamics. The very visibility of the "idiot" narrative—as both symptom and casualty—has sparked a global re-evaluation: what does it mean to know? To explain? To trust? Expert projections suggest a bifurcation. On one path, algorithmic amplification and political polarization deepen epistemic fragmentation—where "truth" becomes a function of affiliation rather than evidence. On the other, a resurgence of public investment in investigative journalism, media literacy, and institutional transparency could reassert the value of rigor and context.
