market for SEL and prosocial skill development tools has exploded, projected to exceed \$25 billion by 2030, according to HolonIQ. Tech companies now offer digital platforms—AI tutors, emotion-detection software, gamified cooperation challenges—positioned as scalable solutions. While these tools promise personalization and data-driven insights, they also raise ethical alarms.
