Eligible residents could apply for reduced fares (up to 50% off) by submitting income verification through partnerships with state agencies and nonprofits. The program tested a “pay-as-you-go” logic, allowing riders to pay less on days with lower income, such as weekends or off-peak hours. Though limited in reach—serving just 12,000 households in its first

year—IBFP demonstrated measurable impact: ridership among low-income riders increased by 18%, and fare evasion dropped by 22% in pilot zones. These results, though preliminary, validated the economic and social rationale for deeper integration. By 2018, digital transformation accelerated the feasibility of more sophisticated models. The CTA introduced Clipper cards with contactless functionality, enabling real-time payment tracking and data aggregation. This infrastructure laid the groundwork for dynamic pricing experiments: in 2020, during the pandemic, the agency piloted “off-peak discounts,” reducing fares by 40% between 10 PM and 6 AM. The move was both economic and behavioral—encouraging ridership redistribution to ease peak congestion while stabilizing daily revenue. A 2023 audit by the Chicago Digital Equity Task Force found that 22% of low-income households lack consistent smartphone access, and 15% have limited digital literacy. While the IVR and in-person enrollment centers help, reliance on digital interfaces

risks marginalizing vulnerable populations. To address this, the CTA partnered with community organizations to deploy “transit access hubs” in high-need neighborhoods—staffed kiosks offering assisted enrollment, paper-based applications, and mobile units that travel to homeless encampments and senior centers.
