Some elders argue that certain narratives risk oversimplifying complex histories, while younger generations demand greater inclusion of Indigenous feminist perspectives and environmental ethics. Controversies also emerge from the museum's engagement with non-Cherokee stakeholders. Globally, the Cherokee model offers a compelling case study in Indigenous cultural sovereignty.
