contested territory of Belize—remained vital. Though only sparsely populated by British loggers and loggers' settlements, Belize's mahogany forests were the economic heart of a regional timber trade worth millions. By the early 1800s, British merchants had established a de facto foothold, operating under a fragile legal ambiguity: while Spain nominally claimed the territory, effective control had long slipped into British hands, sustained by armed logging camps and trade networks that defied formal sovereignty. This precarious balance began to shift after the Treaty of Amiens in 1802—a brief pause in hostilities that granted Britain temporary breathing space. Their purpose was twofold: to protect timber extraction from Spanish incursions and to monitor riverine movement, intercepting French privateers and smuggling networks that threatened Britain's logwood and mahogany supply. The geopolitical context was fraught. Spain, though weakened, retained symbolic sovereignty and occasional military patrols. Yet

its ability to project power in the region was eroded by French naval pressure and internal unrest.
