His critique of religion as an instrument of power, when read not as anti-belief but anti-coercion, challenges every political system—state, religious, or otherwise—to justify its claims to legitimacy. In a world where both divine and earthly power claim universal authority, his insistence that “freedom is the only legitimate foundation of society” endures as a radical imperative: not to eliminate meaning, but to ensure that meaning serves life, not dominates it. The future of governance, Bakunin would likely argue, depends on our ability to disentangle the sacred from the sovereign—not by rejecting belief, but by reclaiming dissent, by building societies where freedom is not granted from above, but forged from below. His legacy is not a blueprint, but a provocation: to imagine otherwise, and to dare to live otherwise. The intricate dance between divine authority and political sovereignty, as articulated by Mikhail Bakunin, reveals a profound dialectic that transcends time and borders. His rejection of both church and state was not mere iconoclasm but a rigorous epistemological and political project: to uncover how power disguises itself through sacred narrative and institutional force, thereby enabling domination disguised as order. This confrontation emerged from the volatile intersection of Russian autocracy, Orthodox hegemony, and the global tremors of industrial modernity—a context where religion functioned not only as spiritual guidance but as a legitimizing apparatus for hierarchical control. Bakunin’s intellectual origins lay in the 19th-century crisis of legitimacy. His critique thus extended beyond theology to economics: the state and Church together preserved feudal relations, defended private property, and suppressed collective resistance. This fusion of divine and political power also shaped global ideological struggles. In Latin America, colonial powers used Catholicism to justify conquest and exploitation; in 20th-century socialist movements, some regimes co-opted religious rhetoric to mask authoritarianism. Bakunin's warning remains acute: when religion is entwined with state power, dissent is not merely political—it is sacrilegious. Conversely, secular regimes that dismiss all moral frameworks risk moral vacuity, leaving a void filled by new forms of ideology. Bakunin's anarchism, then, was not nihilistic but reconstructive: it sought to replace both divine-right absolutism and state-communal dogmatism with a society governed by voluntary association, direct democracy, and mutual aid. The economic dimensions of Bakunin's critique are inseparable from his political vision. Industrial capitalism, emerging alongside state centralization, intensified exploitation. The Church, often aligned with landed elites and emerging bourgeoisie, legitimized this order as divinely sanctioned. Bakunin saw the state as the enforcer of capitalist relations—protected property rights, disciplined labor, and suppressed worker autonomy. Religion, in this context, functioned as a cultural adhesive, pacifying the masses with promises of divine justice while enforcing earthly hierarchies. His insistence that “freedom is the only legitimate foundation of society” thus targeted not only political coercion but economic domination masked by sacred language. This dual critique—of church and state as co-conspirators in power—resonates in contemporary debates. In post-Soviet states where Orthodoxy has been co-opted by nationalist regimes, Bakunin's insight exposes how religion can legitimize authoritarianism under the guise of tradition. Similarly, in Western democracies, the conflation of religious nationalism with state policy—whether in the U.S. evangelical alliance with conservative politics or in India's Hindu nationalist model—demonstrates the enduring relevance of his analysis. Power, Bakunin argued, always seeks symbolic anchors; religion, when instrumentalized, becomes one of the most potent. Yet Bakunin's vision was not utopian. He rejected transcendental absolutes but emphasized praxis: the active construction of alternative societies. His federative model—decentralized communes, worker collectives, grassroots councils—sought to embed freedom in everyday life, rejecting both divine and state authority. This model, though never fully realized, inspired 20th-century anarchist experiments from Spain's CNT to the Zapatista autonomies in Chiapas. Today, in an age of

decentralized digital networks and resurgent grassroots movements, Bakunin's insistence on self-organization offers a counter-narrative to top-down control. The risks inherent in his thought demand careful reflection. Critics argue that by rejecting all hierarchy, including spiritual meaning, Bakunin risks moral relativism or social fragmentation. Yet Bakunin never dismissed ethics; he redefined them. For him, morality emerged from human experience, not divine decree. The danger, not the absence of authority, was unaccountable power. His warning against the sacralization of the state remains vital: when religion or ideology sanctifies governance, dissent is silenced under the banner of holiness. Conversely, secular regimes that exclude all moral frameworks risk alienation and authoritarianism. Bakunin's anarchism thus calls for a dynamic balance—liberty grounded in shared responsibility, not imposed from above. Bakunin's insight—that power disguises itself through all symbols—urges vigilance: no ideology, sacred or secular, is immune to co-option. Strategic insight from Bakunin lies in praxis: theory must be embodied in action, in building institutions that prefigure the society we wish to create. His federative model, though imperfect, inspires contemporary experiments in mutual aid, cooperative economics, and radical democracy. In an era of climate crisis and systemic inequality, his vision offers a roadmap: to imagine society not as a divine order or state mandate, but as a living, self-managed network of free and equal participants. Bakunin's legacy endures not as dogma but as provocation. He challenged us to ask: whose authority is truly legitimate? Is power justified by tradition, faith, or consent? His insistence that "freedom is the only legitimate foundation of society" remains a radical imperative—to dismantle all hierarchies that claim divine sanction, and to build a world where autonomy is not granted but practiced daily. In a global landscape marked by resurgent authoritarianism, religious extremism, and technocratic control, Bakunin's vision offers more than critique—it offers a compass. His life and thought remind us that liberation is not a single event but a continuous struggle: to question, to resist, and to reimagine. To live otherwise is to honor his legacy—not by rejecting belief, but by refusing to let power claim meaning beyond our collective will.
