Conversely, industry insiders like Captain Lars Jensen, a Danish trawler skipper with 40 years at sea, describe maps as ‘double-edged swords.’ ‘They guide us to the richest grounds, but also to places others follow—overfishing becomes a contest, not a conservation challenge.’ Jensen notes that while digital tools improve efficiency, they also create dependency: ‘When the internet fails or the software glitches, we’re back to guesswork—only now the stakes are higher, because we’re fishing faster and farther than ever.’ Fisheries economists warn of a growing ‘data divide.’ ‘Wealthy industrial fleets hoard high-resolution data—bathymetry, chlorophyll, predator-prey dynamics—while small-scale fishers rely on publicly funded but outdated maps,’ explains Dr. Rabab Fatnoussa of the UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO). ‘This imbalance undermines equity and sustainability. Without inclusive access, digital maps risk entrenching exploitation, not stewardship.’

Controversies and Risks: Data, Sovereignty, and Illegal Fishing

The very precision that makes modern fishing maps powerful also invites abuse. Illicit actors exploit gaps in coverage and proprietary data to engage in illegal, unreported, and unregulated (IUU) fishing—estimated to cost the global economy \$23 billion annually. In West Africa, where enforcement is weak, foreign vessels often operate under false registries, using uncorrected maps to evade quotas. Satellite monitoring by organizations like Global Fishing Watch now detects these anomalies, but response depends on political will and data sharing. Another controversy centers on data ownership. Private firms argue that proprietary mapping algorithms protect innovation and investment; activists counter that marine knowledge—especially of shared, migratory stocks—should be a global commons. The FAO’s ‘Voluntary Guidelines on Responsible Fishing’ advocate open-access frameworks, but compliance remains voluntary. In contested zones, data becomes a weapon: nations may suppress or manipulate maps to justify fleet movements, as seen in the South China Sea and Black Sea. Environmental risks also emerge. Over-reliance on bio-economic models—maps calibrated to maximize short-term yield—can ignore ecosystem thresholds. The collapse of Atlantic cod fisheries in the 1990s, driven in part by flawed catch projections embedded in outdated maps, remains a cautionary tale. Today, ‘smart’ maps that
