As the nation grappled with systemic racism and the demand for equity, California's public schools became early laboratories for reimagining history, politics, and civic engagement. The 1970s saw the birth of multicultural education frameworks, driven in part by demographic shifts: the rising Latino population, growing Asian American communities, and urbanization that reshaped classroom demographics. The state's Social Science Framework, first adopted in 1975, marked a deliberate departure from Eurocentric narratives, embedding ethnic studies and critical perspectives into core curricula.
