The Economics of Sanctuary: Tourism, Local Development, and Fiscal Sustainability

Since the site's designation as a national monument in the 19th century, tourism has evolved from a niche curiosity to a cornerstone of Normandy's economic identity. The French government’s €400 million investment in infrastructure—including the new visitor center, eco-friendly pathways, and tidal management systems—was justified not only by preservation needs but by long-term economic viability. A 2023 audit by the Ministry of Culture projected that improved visitor experience and extended stays could increase annual revenue by 25% over the next decade, offsetting maintenance costs and reducing environmental degradation. Yet tensions persist. Critics argue that commercialization risks commodifying sacred space, reducing spiritual and historical depth to scripted entertainment.
