These skills correlate with higher rates of entrepreneurship, social cohesion, and adaptive governance—benefiting not only individuals but entire economies. Yet, resistance persists, particularly in politically conservative regions, where such inclusion is framed as “divisive.”

Controversies over content continue to escalate. Debates rage over whether children should learn about slavery, colonialism, or climate injustice in first grade. In the U.S., “critical race theory” bans restrict discussions of systemic racism, while in Canada, Indigenous content reforms face political backlash. These conflicts reflect deeper societal struggles over whose history is taught, and whose perspectives matter—a battle fought not in classrooms alone, but in policy chambers and public discourse.

Global Comparisons: Divergences and Common Challenges
