Dorsey, a historian specializing in Black religious institutions, notes: 'Deacon formation is not a checklist—it's a process of becoming a moral economist, a cultural archivist, and a systemic critic.' Dr. Cornel West, philosopher and public intellectual, adds: 'In the Black church, the deacon is not merely an officer but a living embodiment of prophetic responsibility—one who confronts both spiritual complacency and structural violence.' These views underscore the role's demands: theological depth, ethical courage, and civic engagement are inseparable. Yet, controversies and risks shadow this vital institution. Traditionalists often resist updating training curricula, arguing that rigid adherence to historical models stifles innovation. Critics within and outside the church question the lack of standardized certification, warning that inconsistent training quality risks misuse of authority. Moreover, deacons face personal risk: in communities where church leadership is contested, leadership training can provoke backlash from rival factions or even law enforcement, particularly when deacons advocate for marginalized members. The 2020 protests across America saw several deacons targeted amid tensions, highlighting the precariousness of their public role. Globally, deacon training finds parallels but distinct expressions. In the Caribbean and Latin America, similar roles exist within Afro-descendant Pentecostal and Methodist churches, but the emphasis differs—often more on spiritual gifts than institutional governance. In contrast, South African churches under apartheid developed deacon-like figures focused heavily on political resistance, mirroring the Black church's role in the U.S. Yet, uniquely in America, deacon training is institutionalized within denominational structures, with formal curricula accredited
