Economic roles and occupational surnames: the invisible economy of Jewish identity Beyond geography and concealment, surnames often signaled economic function. **Schreiber** (scribe), **Kahn** (leader or chief), **Levi** (leopard, symbolizing strength), **Roth** (red, possibly dye-maker), **Sasson** (stone, miner), **Aron** (rock) were not just labels but markers of craft and trade. In medieval Europe, these occupational names signaled contribution to communal life—scribes preserved law, butchers fed markets, bakers fed cities. For Jewish communities, which were often excluded from land ownership and guilds, such surnames reflected both adaptation and resilience.
