The International Energy Agency (IEA) projects that ICE vehicles will account for 90% of global light-duty vehicle sales only until 2030, after which electrification accelerates. The thermodynamic inefficiency of ICEs—where up to 80% of input energy is lost as waste heat—became a liability in a world demanding decarbonization. Nations that once championed ICE manufacturing now face transitional dilemmas: how to sustain industrial employment while phasing out systems designed for maximum entropy release.

Expert Perspectives: Engineers, Economists, and the Energy Transition

From the bench to the boardroom, experts emphasize that ICEs remain a masterclass in applied thermoscience—but their future is defined by adaptation, not obsolescence. Dr. Christoph Buchmann, a combustion physicist at ETH Zurich, notes: 'The ICE is not

dying; it is evolving. The next generation of engines will operate closer to the theoretical limits, using advanced simulations to minimize entropy generation, optimize fuel-air mixing, and capture waste heat through thermoelectric systems.'

Economists like Dr. Fatima Al-Mansoori of the Gulf Research Center caution that ICEs remain embedded in complex supply chains—from rare earth catalysts to precision-machined components—where retrofitting efficiency gains is constrained by material science and manufacturing costs. 'Electrification offers clarity in emissions and efficiency,' she argues, 'but ICEs still dominate heavy transport, aviation, and off-grid applications where energy density and

infrastructure are decisive.'

Environmental scientists, however, frame the debate more starkly. Dr. Raj Patel of the University of Nairobi warns: 'Even with 50% efficiency, ICEs emit CO₂, NO_x, and particulates at scales that overwhelm local ecosystems and global climate targets. The thermodynamic cost of mobility must be measured not just in fuel consumption but in atmospheric transformation.' This divergence underscores a central tension: the ICE, as a physical system, embodies human ingenuity in harnessing energy, yet its continued deployment under climate emergency demands radical rethinking—not abandonment.
