and theological reductionism. These adaptations reveal sacraments not as rigid dogma but as living, contextualized encounters shaped by local history and struggle. The medieval Church's control over baptism, marriage, and burial rites centralized wealth and influence, with tithes funding grand cathedrals and monastic estates.
