When children learn science through Zulu metaphors, they don't just memorize facts; they internalize a worldview that aligns with their lived reality.' His longitudinal research (2020–2023) found that students in Isizulu-medium schools demonstrated stronger critical thinking skills and higher self-efficacy than peers in English-medium settings. 'When a child learns about Shaka not as a warrior in a textbook, but as a figure celebrated in *izindlu* spoken by their grandmother, history becomes personal,' she explains.

Controversies and Risks: Resistance, Standardization, and Equity Gaps
