Capote's meticulous reconstruction of a real

murder, told with novelistic precision, ignited enduring debates: when does reporting become fiction? When does fiction reveal deeper truths? Thucydides' rigor set a precedent for critical source evaluation, yet his account of the Plague of Athens, while factual, was shaped by rhetorical intent—highlighting early tensions between evidence and narrative form. In Rome, Livy's *Ab Urbe Condita* wove historical chronicle with moral exemplar, demonstrating how non-fiction could serve ideological ends. The fall of the Republic became a cautionary tale, not just a record. Meanwhile, in India, the *Mahabharata* blended epic poetry with philosophical discourse, its layered structure allowing multiple truths to coexist—a model later echoed in Islamic historiography and Persian literary traditions. Across civilizations, the boundary between fact and fiction remained porous, shaped less by rigid categories than by cultural purpose. Truth was often rhetorical, embedded in communal values rather than documented proof. The worksheet, in this sense, began not as a tool of verification but as a framework for meaning-making.

Enlightenment and the Birth of Modern Fact-Fiction Distinction

Yet even then, sensationalism thrived—penny press pamphlets exaggerated events to boost circulation, foreshadowing modern media's tension between truth and engagement. The fictional worksheet thus evolved from a narrative device into a contested space of ideological struggle. The French Revolution further complicated this divide. Revolutionary pamphlets used vivid, emotionally charged fiction to mobilize masses, while Enlightenment thinkers like Condorcet debated whether narrative could serve universal reason. The Polish Solidarity movement, for instance, circulated underground publications blending personal testimony with symbolic allegory, turning fiction into a tool of defiance. Collaborative fact-checking networks—like the International Fact-Checking Network—strive to restore public trust.
