This legacy persists: today, Russia maintains over half of the Arctic’s military infrastructure, including the redeveloped Severomorsk naval base and airfields near Murmansk—key nodes in its northern defense doctrine. Yet the most transformative pressure on the tundra today is climate change. The Arctic is warming at more than four times the global average, a phenomenon known as Arctic amplification. This rapid thaw is destabilizing the very foundation of the biome: permafrost, which stores an estimated 1,500 billion tons of carbon—double the amount currently in Earth’s atmosphere. As temperatures rise, permafrost melts, releasing methane and CO₂, creating a self-reinforcing feedback loop that accelerates global warming. Satellite data from the European Space Agency and NASA reveal that summer Arctic sea ice extent has declined by over 40% since 1979, with projections indicating a nearly ice-free summer by the 2030s. The tundra, once stabilized by frozen ground, is now a volatile landscape of collapsing infrastructure, shifting ecosystems, and unpredictable weather patterns.

As ice retreats, access increases, and so does friction. The U.S. Coast Guard’s 2023 Arctic Strategy identifies China—classified as a “near-Arctic state” by Russia—as a “systemic challenge” due to its infrastructure investments and scientific expeditions, raising alarms about dual-use technologies and long-term strategic encroachment. Indigenous communities, often marginalized in these debates, find themselves at the crossroads. While some benefit from employment and revenue-sharing agreements, many resist industrial encroachment that threatens sacred lands, hunting grounds, and cultural continuity. The Sámi Parliament in Norway has challenged mining projects under the European Convention on Human Rights, arguing that development violates rights to self-determination. In Canada, the Inuvialuit Final Agreement of 1984 set a precedent for co-management, but recent pipeline expansions and seismic surveys continue to spark legal battles and protests.
