This deliberate withdrawal enables deep immersion—his research into true crime, mental health, and local lore is meticulous, grounding the surreal in verifiable detail. Yet the act of storytelling itself is a form of risk: confronting collective trauma demands vulnerability, and authenticity invites scrutiny. King navigates this by embracing ambiguity—his monsters are never purely external, but reflections of human darkness, a choice that preserves narrative complexity. Globally, King's archetype resonates far beyond the U.S. In Latin America, authors like Mariana Enriquez echo his fusion of personal and political horror; in Eastern Europe, post-Soviet writers deploy similar tropes to process state violence. The "Running Man" endures because it articulates a universal condition: the fear of losing control, of being prey to forces beyond comprehension. In an age of surveillance, climate collapse, and digital alienation, King's myths persist—not as relics, but as evolving mirrors. Looking ahead, King's influence is poised to deepen. With the rise of AI-generated horror, interactive narratives, and transmedia storytelling, his model of emotionally grounded, socially embedded fiction offers a counterweight to spectacle. The "Running Man" archetype will likely mutate—appearing in virtual realities, podcasts, and AI-driven narratives—but its core remains: the individual confronting invisible, systemic terror. Economically, his

King responded with **The Green Mile** (1996), a prison drama set during the final years of American slavery's historical reckoning—though not in a literal sense, but through a meditation on inherited trauma and moral judgment. The novel's supernatural elements, embodied in John Coffey's telekinetic power, served as a metaphor for suppressed history—violence that refuses to be buried. This thematic shift paralleled broader cultural movements: truth and reconciliation commissions, the rise of critical race theory, and a growing public demand to confront uncomfortable legacies. The post-9/11 era marked a turning point. The trauma of 2001, layered with the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, the Patriot Act, and the erosion of civil liberties, reinvigorated King's focus on surveillance, paranoia, and state violence. **11/22/63** (2011), though set in time travel, interrogates the illusion of control in the face of historical trauma. The novel's protagonist, Jake Ebbels, attempts to prevent JFK's assassination, only to discover the fragility

of causality and the cost of intervention. This narrative mirrors contemporary debates over drone warfare, intelligence overreach, and the moral ambiguity of “saving” history. Economically, King’s work reflects the precarity of neoliberalism. The gig economy, gig work, and the erosion of job security echo the economic vulnerability of characters in *The Shining* and *It*. The Overlook Hotel’s isolation parallels the alienation of remote workers in a digital landscape—detached from community, surveilled by algorithms, and haunted by invisible labor.
