Its value chain resilience was tested during the 2020–2021 supply chain disruptions, when its decentralized distribution model—leveraging rail access via the nearby Norfolk Southern line and direct-to-consumer CSA subscriptions—allowed it to maintain 92% of baseline revenue, far above the national farm average of 67%. This performance underscores a broader shift: small-to-mid scale farms integrating digital platforms and localized logistics to counteract the volatility of global trade. Industry analysts recognize Charlotte Farm as a bellwether for the “resilience agriculture” movement—farms that blend ecological stewardship with economic pragmatism. According to Dr. Elena Marquez, a professor of agroecology at Duke University, “What distinguishes Charlotte is not just its practices, but its institutional memory. Many regenerative farms adopt techniques episodically; this one has embedded them into governance, education, and succession planning.” That

governance includes a board comprising farmers, soil scientists, and community representatives—an innovative structure designed to resist short-term shareholder pressures. In 2018, a proposed expansion into adjacent forested land sparked litigation from environmental groups alleging violations of North Carolina's Forest Conservation Act.
