In this crucible of trauma, the narrative of the apparition arose—not as a spontaneous miracle, but as a narrative constructed to stabilize a fractured society. The friars' account, recorded nearly a century after the events in the *Nican Mopohua* (*Nican* = "say," as in "say this"), describes Juan Diego, a newly baptized indigenous man of mixed Nahua and Messequé heritage, encountering a woman in Nahuatl-speaking dress, bearing no European features, speaking in a voice that "came from above." She identified herself as **Tonantzin**, "Our Mother," a title deeply rooted in pre-Hispanic veneration of earth goddesses and fertility deities. This linguistic and symbolic choice was deliberate. The Nahua people did not perceive Christian deities as foreign; rather, they interpreted them through existing cosmological frameworks. The Virgin's appearance in Tepeyac—a hill once sacred to *Tonantzin*—was a strategic appropriation, a theological bridge that allowed the Church to build upon rather than erase indigenous belief. The *tilma*, a coarse cactus-fiber cloak, further grounded the image in local material culture, resisting the exoticism of European iconography. When Juan Diego presented the image to Bishop Zumárraga, the Church formally recognized the event, but the deeper significance lay in its function: to create a shared spiritual narrative in a society fractured by conquest. Yet this synthesis was not without tension. The Spanish crown and its ecclesiastical allies sought to use the Virgin's image to legitimize colonization, casting conversion as salvation. Indigenous communities, however, reinterpreted the narrative on their own terms. The Virgin became a maternal figure not imposed from above, but emerging from their own spiritual lexicon. Her dark skin—unlike the pale Madonna of European art—was not a deviation, but a recognition of identity. In 1548, the first feast day was celebrated on December 12, a date possibly chosen to align with the winter solstice and indigenous agricultural cycles. By the late 16th century, the Virgin was enshrined in the Mexico City cathedral, her image reproduced in wood and canvas, spreading devotion beyond indigenous communities. Yet resistance persisted. Some indigenous leaders
