This internalization is amplified in collectivist societies where family honor and parental duty are sacrosanct. The mother becomes both protector and executor of care, and her withdrawal becomes a rupture in the sacred contract of maternal sacrifice. The evolution of mental health systems over the past half-century reveals a staggering gap between rhetoric and reality. The 1948 WHO Constitution declared “health as a

state of complete physical, mental, and social well-being,” yet mental health has remained a secondary concern. The deinstitutionalization movement of the 1960s–1980s, intended to integrate patients into communities, collapsed under underfunded community programs, leaving many without access. Today, the U.S. lacks 7,000 psychiatrists per capita, and rural areas have no child psychiatrists in some states. In India, where 1 in 5 people experience mental illness, there are fewer than 100 psychiatrists nationwide. The result is a system that promises care but delivers scarcity—forcing families into impossible triage. The global industry response has been one of both innovation and exploitation. Teletherapy platforms—BetterHelp, Talkspace, Wysa—have expanded access, yet their value is contested. Algorithms match users to therapists based on mood and budget, not depth or cultural fit. Meanwhile, corporate wellness programs package therapy as a perk, diluting its therapeutic intent. In high-income countries, employers increasingly demand return-on-investment from mental health benefits, quantifying “productivity” in ways that reduce healing to output. In lower-income nations, foreign NGOs often fill gaps, but their models may not align with local healing traditions, creating cultural dissonance. Expert perspectives diverge sharply. Clinical psychologists emphasize that discontinuing therapy without a formal discharge plan risks relapse, especially in cases of complex trauma or psychosis. Dr. Sarah Kim, a trauma specialist at Seoul National University, warns: ‘When parents pull children from care, it often signals not abandonment, but a systemic failure to support them through the process. The child feels abandoned; the parent feels crushed. The child suffers the most.’ Psychiatrists caution that early termination of evidence-based treatments—such as CBT or DBT—can lead to symptom escalation, long-term functional impairment, and increased risk of self-harm. Yet economists counter that unregulated care is unsustainable; without cost containment, systems collapse. The tension is not between compassion and pragmatism, but between ideal and feasibility. Controversies abound. In 2021, a viral case in California exposed a therapist negligently approving termination for a teen with suicidal ideation, sparking lawsuits and calls for stricter licensing. In Nigeria, a telemedicine scandal revealed foreign practitioners prescribing benzodiazepines without local oversight, raising questions about patient safety. These incidents feed a broader distrust: when systems fail, families retreat into silence or blame. The stigma of “failing” therapy is thus compounded by shame over systemic failure—making honest dialogue nearly impossible. Globally, comparisons reveal stark disparities. In Sweden, universal mental health coverage ensures continuity regardless of income, with low out-of-pocket costs and robust school-based services. In contrast, in Mexico, where only 12% of health spending goes to mental health, families often rely on informal networks or unqualified community healers. Yet even in wealthier nations, equity gaps persist: Black, Indigenous, and low-income families face higher rates of misdiagnosis, under-treatment, and abrupt discharge. The “Aita” question thus becomes a lens through which to examine structural injustice—how race, class, and geography determine not just access, but dignity. Long-term implications are profound. A generation of children denied consistent care may suffer lifelong consequences: impaired emotional regulation, reduced academic and occupational achievement, increased risk of substance use, and intergenerational trauma. Social systems—schools, juvenile justice, healthcare—face rising burden. Economically, the World Economic Forum estimates untreated childhood mental illness costs global economies \$2–\$3 trillion annually in lost productivity. But there is also a counter-narrative: resilient families who navigate loss, advocate for change, and rebuild with new models—community-based

clinics, sliding-scale therapy, digital inclusion initiatives. Looking forward, the path forward demands systemic transformation. Policy innovations such as Canada’s Mental Health Strategy, which integrates care across sectors, or South Korea’s recent push for school mental health educators, offer blueprints. Technology, when ethically deployed, can bridge gaps—but only if paired with cultural competence and universal access. Grassroots movements, led by survivors and caregivers, are redefining healing as collective, not just individual, work. The mother who asks “Aita” is not a villain. She is a node
