Dr. Arjun Mehta, a behavioral scientist at the National University of Singapore, views Ati as a 'paradigm shift in preventive psychiatry': 'By embedding continuous monitoring into treatment, we move from reactive crisis care to dynamic, adaptive support—especially vital for at-risk populations like adolescents and veterans.' He cites a Singaporean study where Ati-integrated dCBT reduced relapse rates by 35% among depression patients. Yet critics warn of deepening inequities and clinical erosion. In Indonesia's Aceh province, where Ati proctoring was rolled out in state-run mental health centers in 2022, reports surfaced of patients pressured to participate under threat of benefit denial. Human rights groups documented cases where refusal led to delayed care, blurring the line between voluntary engagement and structural compulsion. Consent, ideally informed and ongoing, often becomes a procedural checkbox. While proponents frame data collection as therapeutic, the same tools enable behavioral profiling increasingly shared with third parties—government agencies, employers, insurers. In Malaysia, a 2024 exposé revealed that Ati data was accessed by immigration authorities to assess mental fitness for visa renewals, prompting parliamentary debate on civil liberties. These intersections of health and state power threaten to redefine mental illness as a matter of social governance rather than medical care.
