For policymakers, the imperative is clear: respond not with isolation, but with adaptive strategies that balance engagement and resilience. Diversifying supply chains, strengthening multilateral institutions, and promoting transparent, rules-based trade can mitigate dependency while preserving cooperation. For scholars and citizens, understanding this evolution demands moving beyond simplistic binaries of “good” and “bad” power—toward a nuanced analysis of how economic systems shape, and are shaped by, the global order. The future of economic imperialism is not predetermined. It will be contested, negotiated, and redefined—by China, by its partners, and by the institutions that govern our shared world.
