But as democratization swept Eastern Europe after 1989, former surveillance states like East Germany began reckoning with their past. The 1990s saw the first formal efforts to acknowledge the pink triangle’s historical trauma: Germany’s 1994 law recognizing homosexuality as a persecuted category, and the 1997 establishment of the International Day Against Homophobia, which adopted the pink triangle as its icon. This was not merely symbolic; it was a political act, a refusal to let state violence fade into silence. Yet the symbol’s trajectory became more complex as it crossed

borders. In Russia, where post-Soviet conservatism fused state power with religious nationalism, the pink triangle reemerged not as a sign of pride but as a criminalized emblem. Since 2013, Russia's "gay propaganda" laws have criminalized public displays of LGBTQ+ identity, with the pink triangle often targeted in state-sponsored campaigns of erasure. For activists, it became a quiet act of defiance—worn in hidden spaces, tattooed beneath skin, or embedded in underground art. The contrast with Western Europe could not be starker: where the triangle is increasingly celebrated in Pride parades and museum exhibitions, in Moscow it is a forbidden gesture, a reminder of both personal risk and systemic oppression. In Ukraine, the symbol took on new urgency amid war. For queer Ukrainians, the triangle became a declaration: "We survive, and we are part of this nation's future." This reframing underscores a broader truth: the pink triangle's meaning is not fixed.
