The HeLa case offers a cautionary tale: unregulated extraction risks both human dignity and long-term scientific legitimacy. From a geopolitical lens, Henrietta's cells became instruments of soft power. During the Cold War, U.S. scientific prowess was showcased through breakthroughs enabled by HeLa, yet the human price was obscured. Today, as nations like China, India, and Brazil invest heavily in genomics and biotechnology, the legacy of HeLa

informs debates over sovereignty, data sharing, and equitable access. The global biotech race, once defined by discovery alone, now increasingly confronts questions of justice and inclusion—issues Henrietta’s story helped bring to the forefront.
