Its evolution was shaped by geopolitical and economic currents that extend far beyond the 1920s. The post-WWI global moment—marked by colonial unrest, the rise of

Pan-Africanism, and the collapse of old empires—created fertile ground for Black intellectual autonomy. Figures like W.E.B. Du Bois, Langston Hughes, Zora Neale Hurston, and Claudia Jones did not merely write; they theorized. They articulated a Black modernity that challenged European universalism, proposed new modes of artistic expression, and laid groundwork for later civil rights and postcolonial movements.
