The discovery of immune checkpoint regulation—later crystallized in therapies like pembrolizumab—owed much to this systems-level understanding. Yet, as Weinberg cautioned, the microenvironment's dual role—as both ally and adversary—complicates intervention. The U.S.-led Cancer Moonshot initiative, launched in 2016, sought to accelerate immunotherapy development through international collaboration, yet critics argue it deepened North-South divides in research ownership. Weinberg noted that true progress demands open data sharing, decentralized clinical trials, and technology transfer—elements often sidelined by competitive patenting. The recent push for mRNA cancer vaccines, inspired by infectious disease platforms, exemplifies both promise and peril: while rapid iteration accelerates discovery, it risks marginalizing populations excluded from trial enrollment. Controversies surround the commercialization of cancer biology. The industry's reliance on biomarker-driven trials has led to “basket” and “umbrella” studies that prioritize molecular subtypes over traditional histology. While logically sound, this shift marginalizes patients whose tumors lack identifiable targets, reinforcing inequities. Weinberg criticized the “genomics halo,” where media hype outpaces clinical utility—patients chasing unproven therapies based on speculative genomic profiles. In Nigeria, for instance, cervical cancer—responsive to early HPV vaccination and screening—remains a leading cause of mortality due to limited access to primary care and diagnostic tools. Weinberg underscored that cancer biology itself is universal, but its translation is profoundly contextual. Molecular diagnostics, effective in controlled Western settings, falter without trained personnel, stable supply chains, and affordable reagents. In sub-Saharan Africa, fewer than 10% of eligible women receive cervical cancer screening, and fewer than 1% access advanced treatments. The WHO estimates that 60% of cancer deaths in LMICs are preventable through early detection and basic interventions—yet these remain out of reach. Economic models exacerbate the divide. High-cost therapies, often priced beyond public health budgets, prioritize affluent populations. In Brazil, where public health coverage is robust, universal access to immunotherapy exists, but at significant fiscal cost. In contrast, private systems in Mexico and Indonesia favor out-of-pocket spending, deepening health disparities. Weinberg warned that without coordinated global

action—through technology transfer, pooled procurement, and equitable clinical trial design—cancer will persist as a disease of privilege.
