His **Homilies** and **Contra Celsum** laid the groundwork for a hermeneutic that saw Scripture not as static text but as a multilayered revelation, accessible through spiritual discernment. Yet, this interpretive freedom clashed with emerging demands for doctrinal orthodoxy. By the 4th century, as Christianity transitioned from persecuted faith to state religion under Constantine, commentary became a tool of institutional control. The Council of Nicaea (325) and subsequent ecumenical councils established dogma, and scripture was increasingly interpreted through creedal boundaries. The Latin Vulgate, commissioned by Jerome in the late 4th century, became the definitive textual foundation for Western Catholic exegesis.
