The IMF stepped in with a \$2.9 billion Extended Fund Facility, but its conditions—fiscal consolidation, subsidy removal, and structural reforms—posed acute political and social challenges. Yet the scale of debt—70% of GDP—exceeds even Greece's peak, and the political will for radical reform remains contested. Geopolitically, the Suggested Solution CA is not merely an economic document but a strategic pivot. Sri Lanka's membership in the Bay of Bengal Initiative (BIMSTEC), its participation in India's Indo-Pacific strategy, and growing engagement with the Quad's infrastructure partnerships position it as a node in Indo-Pacific connectivity.
