The Pearl River Delta in China, for instance, evolved into a mega-hub where textile mills, dyeing facilities, cutting houses, and garment factories operated in tight proximity, minimizing transit time and cost. Similarly, Bangladesh's rise was fueled by preferential trade access to Europe and the U.S., allowing it to capture over 40% of global garment exports by the 2020s. These clusters created logistical agglomerations—ecosystems where suppliers, logistics firms, and retailers co-evolved, enabling unprecedented speed and scale. By 2030, AI-driven logistics platforms will likely dominate supply chain planning, reducing lead times to days rather than weeks. China's dominance, while enduring, is being challenged by rising labor costs, environmental regulations, and geopolitical scrutiny. The U.S. Inflation Reduction Act and EU's CBAM are introducing new economic levers—carbon pricing, local content requirements—that incentivize domestic or regional production. This trend toward "friend-shoring" and "near-shoring" risks fragmenting global supply chains, increasing costs but enhancing strategic resilience. Russia's invasion of Ukraine further underscored vulnerabilities, disrupting Black Sea logistics and prompting

European retailers to seek alternative sourcing routes through the Caucasus and Central Asia. The Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) exemplifies how infrastructure investment is reshaping logistical geopolitics. By expanding
