Biometric identification systems, once confined to airports and military installations, now permeate urban life. Smartphones, wearables, and even public Wi-Fi networks generate continuous streams of behavioral and physiological data. This

data is processed by cloud-based platforms that apply machine learning to detect patterns, flag anomalies, and generate profiles—often without consent or awareness. The financial sector is equally transformed. Credit scoring models now incorporate social media activity, online behavior, and even smartphone usage patterns. In China, the Social Credit System integrates financial trust with civic behavior, rewarding or penalizing citizens based on algorithms that remain largely inscrutable. In the West, similar trends manifest through “alternative data” used in lending, hiring, and insurance—raising concerns about bias, fairness, and due process. This industrial expansion has reshaped labor and power dynamics. A new class of data brokers, analysts, and algorithm auditors has emerged, but power remains concentrated among a few tech oligopolies. These firms wield unprecedented influence over public opinion, political outcomes, and individual autonomy—often operating in legal gray zones where accountability is diffuse and enforcement slow.
