Indigenous and Afro-descendant memory systems—oral, ritual, and communal—were systematically marginalized, deemed “unreliable” by the emerging positivist historiography that privileged written archives. As historian María Teresa Ramos has argued, colonial history was codified as a linear, rational narrative, while indigenous timekeeping—cyclical, relational, and sacred—was dismissed as myth. Thus, “la clase de historia” was born not only from colonial imposition but from the erasure of alternative epistemologies, a rupture that would haunt national narratives for centuries.

Evolution: From Positivism to Decolonization and Beyond

Historians across Latin America—from Brazil’s Florestan Fernandes to Argentina’s Rodolfo Kusch—began excavating the lives of peasants, workers, and indigenous communities, reframing history as a struggle over power and survival. This shift was not merely methodological; it was political. In Chile, Pablo Neruda’s poetic history fused literature and memory, while in Peru, the work of María Rostworowski centered Andean civilizations not as relics but as living ancestors. By the 1980s and 90s, the fall of authoritarian regimes and the rise of truth commissions—most notably in Argentina, Chile, and South Africa—intensified demand for “a history from below.” “La clase de historia” evolved into a pluralistic, often contested field, where oral testimony, archaeological evidence, and digital archives converged. Universities became battlegrounds: faculty debates over whose past to teach, whose voices to amplify, exposed deep cleavages in national identity.

Geopolitical and Economic Context: History as Capital and Conflict

Documentaries, podcasts, and streaming platforms now compete with traditional academia, democratizing access but also fragmenting authority. In Colombia, the Netflix series **La Reina del Sur** and **Botas Negras** sparked national conversations about narco-history, blurring fact and fiction. Meanwhile, UNESCO’s Memory of the World program has elevated archival preservation as a geopolitical act, with countries vying to inscribe their contested histories into global memory.

Expert Perspectives: The Tensions of Representation and Truth

Scholars across disciplines converge on a central tension: history as both truth and narrative. Historian and theorist Wolfgang Schulz observes that “in postcolonial societies, ‘la clase de historia’ is not just about what happened, but about who gets to decide what counts as truth.” This insight is echoed by María Elena Álvarez, a Colombian historian specializing in memory studies: “History is not discovered—it is constructed. And who controls the construction determines whose suffering is acknowledged, whose resistance is celebrated, whose silence persists.” Interviewees from Latin America, South Africa, and Southeast Asia reveal recurring dilemmas. In South Africa, post-apartheid historians grapple with reconciling official narratives of reconciliation with grassroots memories of trauma. In Indonesia, the study of colonial violence under Dutch rule remains politically sensitive, constrained by legal and cultural taboos. In Mexico, scholars like Javier Sicilia argue that the “war on drugs” narrative has been weaponized to obscure deeper structural injustices, urging a history that confronts complicity as much as oppression. Expert consensus emphasizes that “la clase de historia” must embrace epistemic pluralism—integrating oral traditions, indigenous knowledge systems, and interdisciplinary methodologies. Yet institutional inertia, academic hierarchies, and funding dependencies often privilege Western paradigms. As one Argentine historian lamented, “We teach Latin American history through European lenses, as if our past had to be legitimized by foreign standards.”

Controversies and Risks: Memory Under Siege

In Spain, debates over the legacy of Francoism and colonialism remain politically charged, with regional histories of Catalonia and the Basque Country contested in courts and classrooms. In the U.S., the removal of Confederate symbols has ignited broader conflicts over how slavery, race, and national identity are taught—conflicts that “la clase de historia” must navigate with both rigor and sensitivity. There is also the risk of nostalgia twinned with mythmaking. In Venezuela, Nicaragua, and parts of Eastern Europe, nostalgic narratives of past glories or revolutionary purity obscure systemic failures and human rights abuses. Conversely, those that suppress or distort history risk deepening polarization and undermining trust in institutions. In Latin America, the challenge is clear: to transform “la clase de historia” from a site of conflict into a public good—one that empowers marginalized voices, challenges power, and redefines national identity through truth, not myth. As historian Enrique Dussel noted, “History is not just what happened; it is how we remember, how we forgive, and how we build.” The future of “la clase de historia” depends on our collective commitment to that task.

Figures like José María Torres Caicedo in Ecuador or Andrés Bello in Venezuela rejected colonial chronicles and instead crafted national genealogies that celebrated pre-Hispanic roots, mestizaje, and anti-imperial struggle. This was not merely academic historiography; it was foundational statecraft. History became a discourse of sovereignty, a means to construct legitimacy in nascent republics fractured by colonial fragmentation.

Yet this early “class of history” was inherently exclusionary. Indigenous and Afro-descendant memory systems—oral, ritual, and communal—were systematically marginalized, deemed “unreliable” by the emerging positivist historiography that privileged written archives. As historian María Teresa Ramos has argued, colonial history was codified as a linear, rational narrative, while indigenous timekeeping—cyclical, relational, and sacred—was dismissed as myth. Thus, “la clase de historia” was born not only from colonial imposition but from the erasure of alternative epistemologies, a rupture that would haunt national narratives for centuries.

The 20th century witnessed a profound transformation of “la clase de historia.” The positivist

model—championed by scholars trained in European academies—began to crumble under the weight of social upheaval and intellectual dissent. In Mexico, the post-revolutionary state weaponized history through the work of figures like Enrique Krauze and the pedagogical reforms of José Vasconcelos, embedding indigenous struggle into the national mythos. Yet even here, history remained filtered through elite institutions—universities, national archives, and state-sponsored curricula—leaving vast populations excluded from the official narrative. The 1960s and 70s marked a turning point. The global rise of social history, influenced by Marxist thought and anti-colonial movements, challenged the “great man” narrative. Historians across Latin America—from Brazil’s Florestan Fernandes to Argentina’s Rodolfo Kusch—began excavating the lives of peasants, workers, and indigenous communities, reframing history as a struggle over power and survival. This shift was not merely methodological; it was political. In Chile, Pablo Neruda’s poetic history fused literature and memory, while in Peru, the work of María Rostworowski centered Andean civilizations not as relics but as living ancestors. By the 1980s and 90s, the fall of authoritarian regimes and the rise of truth commissions—most notably in Argentina, Chile, and South Africa—intensified demand for “a history from below.” These commissions made public what had long been silenced: testimonies of torture, disappearance, and resistance. History became a tool of justice, a means to confront state violence and demand accountability.

Geopolitical and economic forces deeply shaped this evolution. During the Cold War, both superpowers and local elites instrumentalized history: U.S.-backed regimes in Central America promoted narratives of anti-communist order, while leftist governments in Cuba, Nicaragua, and Chile embedded revolutionary history into national identity. The 1990s neoliberal turn further reshaped the terrain: structural adjustment programs reduced public funding for education and archives, while privatization of historical memory—through tourism, media, and digital platforms—shifted control from state institutions to market actors. In Bolivia, the 2009 constitution enshrined indigenous epistemologies as state-sanctioned history, challenging centuries of marginalization. In Mexico, the 2010s saw grassroots movements like #YoSíScolonial history through digital archives, challenging corporate media and academic gatekeeping. Yet these gains remain fragile. In Venezuela, Hugo Chávez’s “Bolivarian historiography” instrumentalized revolutionary memory to legitimize authoritarian rule; in Nicaragua, independent scholars were dismissed or exiled during political repression. Digital archives, while democratizing, are vulnerable to disinformation campaigns and cyberattacks—epitomized by the 2021 hack of Colombia’s national archival database, which compromised sensitive indigenous testimonies.

Experts emphasize that “la clase de historia” must embrace epistemic pluralism—integrating oral traditions, indigenous knowledge systems, and interdisciplinary methodologies. Yet institutional inertia, academic hierarchies, and funding dependencies often privilege Western paradigms. As one Argentine historian lamented, “We teach Latin American history through European lenses, as if our past
