Traditional accounts, shaped by 19th-century nationalist and civilizational paradigms, framed late antiquity as a period of decay—plagues, invasions, inflation, and moral decline. Brown dismantled this myth with meticulous evidence: the Eastern Roman (Byzantine) Empire did not merely preserve Greco-Roman civilization but actively reinterpreted it through Christian and ascetic lenses. His central thesis—articulated through chapters on “The Christian Revolution,” “The Economy and Society,” and “The Transformation of Power”—posits late antiquity as an age of profound ideological and institutional metamorphosis, where old frameworks were not erased but transmuted. Brown roots this transformation in the geopolitical turbulence of the 3rd century: the Crisis of the Third Century, with its civil wars, barbarian incursions, and economic disintegration, destabilized the Western Roman Empire while paradoxically reinforcing centralized authority in the East. The division of the empire under Diocletian (285 CE) was not a sign of weakness but a strategic recalibration. For Brown, the Eastern Empire's survival from Antioch to Constantinople was less a continuation of Rome than a reimagining—one where Greek became the lingua franca of administration and theology, and imperial power increasingly intertwined with the Christian Church. The edict of Milan (313) and Constantine's patronage of Christianity were not abrupt ruptures but evolutionary steps in a longer process of sacralizing authority. Economically, Brown dismantles the myth of systemic collapse. Far from stagnation, the late antique economy evolved through decentralization, monetization shifts, and the rise of localized production. The debasement of currency, often cited as evidence of decline, is reinterpreted as a pragmatic response to fiscal pressures, not systemic failure. Agricultural estates (**latifundia**) adapted to labor shortages caused by plague and migration, with tenant farming and colonate systems emerging as precursors to medieval feudalism. Brown emphasizes the role of trade networks—especially in the Mediterranean and Red Sea—remaining robust, sustained by merchant elites and ecclesiastical institutions that facilitated long-distance exchange even amid political upheaval. The decline of urban centers like Rome was not uniform; cities such as Alexandria, Ephesus, and Carthage persisted as hubs of production and learning, their economies sustained by regional specialization and religious patronage. The intellectual landscape of late antiquity, as Brown traces, was defined by a radical reorientation of knowledge. The Library of Alexandria's symbolic end is less a literal rupture than a cultural metaphor; what endured were textual traditions preserved by monastic scriptoria across Syria, Egypt, and Anatolia. Brown's analysis of figures like Augustine, Gregory of Nazianzus, and John Chrysostom reveals a shift from classical rhetoric to theological exegesis, where philosophy served not civic virtue but divine truth. This “Christian revolution,” as Brown terms it, was not anti-int
