His memoir, while grounded in these concrete legal battles, transcended case files by weaving personal narratives—those of Walter McMillian, a Black man wrongly convicted and sentenced to death, and others whose stories embodied broader systemic fractures. The book's power lay in its fusion of rigorous reporting and moral urgency, a hallmark of investigative journalism that demands both evidentiary integrity and emotional resonance.
