Although PDFs are stable, technology continues to evolve. Using widely supported features and avoiding proprietary extensions improves long-term compatibility. Regularly reviewing tools and standards helps keep Mlb Black History Month usable across future platforms.

Future-proofing also involves maintaining editable source files alongside PDFs. This practice allows efficient updates and ensures adaptability as requirements change.
