The rise of private equity and sovereign wealth funds (SWFs) since 2010 has further transformed financial governance. Firms like RedBird Capital, CVC, and Abu Dhabi's Mubadala now hold stakes in entities from Formula 1 (Ferrari, Aston Martin) to Premier League clubs (Manchester City's Abu Dhabi ownership). This capital infusion brings scale and innovation but also introduces new tensions. Match-fixing scandals tied to betting syndicates—exposed in Italian football and Baltic leagues—reveal how financial incentives corrupt sporting integrity. In emerging markets, corruption in public funding for stadiums (e.g., Brazil's 2014 World Cup) raises questions about fiscal transparency and social return on investment. The 2021 European Super League (ESL) fiasco epitomized the tension between financial ambition and fan ownership: a breakaway consortium of elite clubs, backed by private equity, sought to capture 30%+ of global football's revenue, sparking global backlash and regulatory reprisal. The ESL's collapse underscored that fan sentiment and institutional legitimacy remain critical financial constraints. Risk assessment in sport finance has grown increasingly sophisticated.
