Inmunidad adaptativa: la defensa específica y duradera

Tipos de inmunidad según su origen

Inmunidad activa

La inmunidad activa se produce cuando el propio cuerpo genera una respuesta inmunitaria tras la exposición a un patógeno o a una vacuna. El organismo produce anticuerpos y células de memoria que protegen a largo plazo. Por ejemplo, cuando alguien se recupera de una enfermedad como la varicela, desarrolla inmunidad activa natural, porque su sistema inmunológico aprendió a combatir el virus. De forma similar, cuando una persona se vacuna contra la gripe, está desarrollando inmunidad activa artificial.

Inmunidad pasiva

La inmunidad pasiva ocurre cuando se transfieren anticuerpos preparados desde otro organismo. Esta inmunidad no depende de la activación del propio sistema inmunológico y suele ser temporal. Algunos ejemplos comunes son:

1. **Inmunidad pasiva natural:** los anticuerpos que una madre le transmite a su bebé a través de la placenta o la leche materna.
2. **Inmunidad pasiva artificial:** la administración de sueros o anticuerpos específicos para tratar o prevenir infecciones en situaciones de emergencia.

Este tipo de inmunidad es fundamental en recién nacidos y personas inmunodeprimidas, ya que ofrece protección inmediata aunque no duradera.
