a decisive push through the shattered defenses. Giustiniani's fall marked the collapse of organized resistance, and Constantine XI died in the fighting—his body never recovered. The immediate aftermath saw the city's transformation. Mehmed II declared it "Kostantiniyye," reorienting its identity toward Islamic governance and Ottoman administration. The Hagia Sophia, once the apex of Byzantine religious architecture, was converted into a mosque, its mosaics covered, its liturgical function silenced. Yet the conquest was not merely symbolic: it triggered a realignment of trade routes, as Ottoman control of the Bosphorus enabled monopolization of Black Sea grain and Silk Road commerce. The Venetian and Genoese trading posts diminished in influence, while Constantinople emerged as a new hub of Islamic learning, diplomacy, and pilgrimage—its markets thrumming with merchants from the Maghreb to the Caucasus. From a long-term geopolitical perspective, 1453 marked the definitive end of medieval Europe's eastern frontier.
