The glass itself, often plate-

glass or early rolled plate, carries a soft diffuse quality, diffusing harsh light into a diffused glow that softens interior volumes and blurs the line between inside and out. Yet Wright's window designs evolved far beyond this early period. In the 1920s and 1930s, as the Great Depression reshaped economic realities and architectural tastes, he began to experiment with new materials and spatial configurations. The Darwin D. Martin House (1904) and the Ennis House (1924) reveal a growing sophistication in glazing—larger expanses of glass, angular forms, and integration with terrazzo and concrete planes.
