As bell hooks noted, “the personal is political”—and for women, the personal included mastering a language that too often silenced them. The suffrage movements of the late 19th century marked a turning point. Women like Emmeline Pankhurst and Ida B. Wells leveraged rhetoric not just to demand rights, but to reclaim voice as resistance. Their speeches—passionate, unapologetic—challenged the notion that women’s speech was inherently less authoritative. Yet even then, their language was scrutinized: “too emotional,” “hysterical”—a double standard that persists in subtler forms today.
