As English merchants adopted and adapted Latin and later French financial concepts, words like ‘credit’ (from Latin **credere**, to believe, trust), ‘debt,’ and ‘loan’ emerged as foundational. These terms were not abstract; they encoded real economic relationships between lenders and borrowers, often formalized through promissory notes and bills of exchange. By the 16th century, the expansion of maritime trade and the establishment of joint-stock companies—such as the East India Company—necessitated new financial instruments and terminology. ‘Equity,’ rooted in Old French **équité** (fairness), began to denote ownership shares in companies, distinguishing them from debt-based claims. ‘Stock,’ from the Dutch **stoel** (a seat, symbolizing ownership), entered English usage to describe shares in corporations.

These terms were not merely commercial—they represented a shift from feudal land-based wealth to capital-based enterprise. The 17th century marked a turning point with the founding of the Bank of England in 1694, the world's first modern central bank. Its creation institutionalized public credit, introducing terms like 'gilt-edged securities' (government bonds) and 'bank note'—legal instruments that formalized monetary authority. Par 'capital' evolved beyond physical assets to include 'human capital,' reflecting growing recognition of labor and skills as economic inputs. The Industrial Revolution accelerated vocabulary growth. Terms like 'factory,' 'capital investment,' and 'return on investment' (ROI) entered common use, aligning language with mechanization and large-scale production. The 19th century saw the globalization of finance, with London's financial district exporting terminology across empires. 'Bond,' 'stock,' 'dividend,' and 'equity' became standardized through international exchanges and regulatory frameworks. 'Interest' was formalized in legal contracts, while 'liquidity'—derived from 'liquid' (easily movable)—came to describe the ease with which assets convert to cash. The 20th century's financial revolutions—from the Great Depression to the rise of

derivatives—introduced voluminous new vocabulary. ‘Leverage,’ once a naval metaphor, became central to investment strategy, describing amplified returns via borrowed funds. ‘Credit default swap’ (CDS), invented in the 1990s, encapsulated complex risk transfer mechanisms. ‘Shadow banking,’ coined in the early 2000s, exposed opaque financial intermediation outside regulatory oversight. Each term reflected not just innovation but systemic risk, power, and regulation. The 2008 crisis crystallized the political weight of financial language. Terms like ‘TARP’ (Troubled Asset Relief Program), ‘quantitative easing,’
