Against this backdrop, Arnold turned to poetry not as a mere cultural artifact, but as a repository of enduring human insight. His study was catalyzed by a profound dissatisfaction with the dominant discourse of his time—what he called "anarchy" not in the political sense, but as a cultural void: a society fractured by materialism, moral relativism, and the erosion of shared values. Poetry, for Arnold, offered a counterweight: a discipline of disciplined thought and emotional clarity that could illuminate the soul's path through uncertainty.
